

JR PAST PRESIDENT MESSAGE

I hope this message finds you well. As you may know our current President is a bit of a history buff and asked me to write on the history of The Moose. If you saw me speak at any point last year, I always advocated that I believe the Lodge, Chapter and Moose Legion need to work as one. If we support each other and work together we will be able to accomplish so much more. I hope by reading the below history you will see we have been working together since the beginning and need to continue to do so. As always...remember your why.

HISTORY OF THE WOMEN OF THE MOOSE

The "Moose Legion" or "Degree of Service" was created by resolution during the annual convention of the Supreme Lodge in Cincinnati, Ohio, and adopted by the Supreme Council in 1913 as the Mooseheart Legion of the World." Initially, and continuing until 1931, women enjoyed full membership as an intricate part of the Mooseheart Legion of the World. Early issues of the Moose Magazine proclaimed this union of men and women with the headlines... "Mooseheart Legion for Men and Women."

Rodney Brandon, the "Moose Legion" degree's first administrator carrying the title Grand Regent devised the first emblem, which incorporated a moose head centered in a pyramid with the letter's "F", "H", and "C" at its points superimposed over a heart, surrounded by a circle and containing the words "Alces" and "Machlis," all of which had individual meanings. The pyramid symbolized the core of our existence, Faith, Hope and Charity, while the heart symbolized heart of the fraternity, and the word "Alces" meaning moose or large beast and "Machlis" meaning leader. The emblem was used in conjunction with the Women of the Moose until 1991, when a change was made to give both the Moose Legion and the Women of the Moose specific logo identity.

Though the Women of the Moose (originally termed the Women of Mooseheart Legion) had received formal recognition as a Moose auxiliary in 1913, they at first had little structured program of their own beyond the Chapter level. That changed in 1921, when James J. Davis, (247th member of the Loyal Order of Moose and the founder of Mooseheart), met and hired a remarkable woman named Katherine Smith. When the 19th Amendment had granted women the right to vote in 1920, Smith, (from Indianapolis,) reasoned correctly, that women in politics would be a "growth market."

She quit her secretarial job to go to work in Warren Harding's successful Presidential campaign--and, still in her 20s, she was rewarded with an appointment as Director of Public Employment in Washington. Labor Secretary, James J. Davis, was her boss, and he immediately recognized her talent and drive. It took him five years to convince her to quit her government job and go to work for him running the Women of the Moose. A stereotypical "women's program" held no interest for her, Smith argued. "So, get out there and make a program," Davis retorted. She did exactly that, as the organization's first Grand Chancellor. The year 1931 brought the formal organization of the Women of the Moose, and produced an amicable split from the men, as a separate and distinct unit of the fraternity. Katherine Smith served as Grand Chancellor of the Women of the Moose for 38 years until her retirement in 1964, at which point the Women of the Moose boasted 250,000 members.

You would not believe how that Florida weather can take its toll on flags!

These funds also pay for all the membership incentives provided to our members who continue to sponsor and help our fraternity grow. The Five Star Award party at the Mid-Year Conference, the 25 Club party at the Annual Convention. Also, all the entertainment provided and other award programs such as the CNMA Achievement Award. The Association also subsides the cost of training programs, absorbs all the fees associated with electronic payments including the fees charged for online registration, using credit or debit cards when purchasing our amazing merchandise offerings (thank you Jeanne Boss and your amazing team!), and other online sales.

Let's not forget about our Moosehaven residents and Mooseheart students. We provide them with gifts cards to commemorate their birthdays and Christmas. We have sent them shirts and other gifts as well. We have an amazing Moosehaven Committee who sends them cards and special reminders to ensure they know that the members of the CNMA appreciate them.

It takes a lot to run an Association as large as ours and without these dues we would not be able to be a contributing organization to The Moose, our communities and our members. The Executive Committee is grateful for all the amazing members we have! Thank you for all you do!

Let's share that love so everyone knows what we stand for. There are so many **FUN** things going on in the Lodges, Chapters and Moose Legions.



At school, each day they have a 10 to 1 ratio of

students to teachers, which offers every student a lot of individual attention. They actually have one class in elementary school that is a combination of kindergarten, 1st and 2nd grades. They are a group of ten students, and their teacher is enjoying the challenge. She is a 40-year Mooseheart teaching veteran!

Homecoming week was a great success, and everyone had a wonderful time. The Homecoming King and Queen were crowned on the soccer field during half-time while everyone cheered them on. Founder's Day weekend brought more beautiful weather to Mooseheart. It was crisp, cool and sunny all weekend. Michigan Lodge won the attendance trophy this year. They had six more members on campus than Ohio. They all participated in reverse Trick or Treat with the kids as they visited each home and dropped off candy for Halloween. Committee members from both states worked from Friday at 8am until late into the night to prepare a Haunted House for all the students to enjoy. 












Youth Awareness Committee Chair & Coordinator – Bridget Robinson

Greetings,

Our committee has been conducting Youth Awareness (YA) Congresses since July which are now completed for the 2025-2026 year.

Any high school student that is interested in the Youth Awareness Scholarship program must attend a YA Congress each year. A student can participate every

year until they graduate, including previous scholarship winners!

Our YA Coordinators drove over 1,000 miles, to conduct 15 YA Congresses, and we were able to host about 80 high school students. Those students are in the process of giving 'Kids Talks' to students aged 4-12. Their 'Kids Talks' reports must be completed and mailed to me by December 28th. All the student reports are compiled and given to high school honor students, to review and score. Those results will be given to me in mid-January. We wish all the high school students participating the Best of Luck!

Many people have asked "how many finalists will we have?" That number is based on the total number of students that attended the YA Congresses in California and Nevada, and we have been awarded seven finalists each year for the past two years. The state coordinators turn in all of our California Nevada Moose Association reports (those are the informational reports regarding each YA Congress) to Moose International by November 15th. Now we wait to hear how many finalists we will be awarded.

Youth Awareness starts with **YOU**!!! Our YA Committee would like to thank the Lodges that hosted a YA Congress! A huge thank you to all the Lodges, Chapters, and Moose Legions, who sponsored students to participate in this program. The annual \$35,000 scholarship money is donated by the Moose Legion!!

Where do your donations go? Our fundraising provides the \$50 gift cards for each student that complete the program, and the \$500 checks that are awarded to each finalist. It also pays for the airfare and hotel for the students that we bring to our state conferences and conventions. There are a lot that makes our Youth Awareness Program work.

MOOSE HISTORY

On Thanksgiving Day 1914, James J Davis married Miss Jeannette Rodenbaugh in Los Angeles, California. James was 41, Jean was 27. They went on to have 5 children, James Jr, followed by Jane, Jean, Joan and Jewell.

Behind every great man is an even greater woman. Everything Fred Astaire could do, Ginger Rogers did. Ginger did it backwards, and in high heels!

Mrs. Davis was quite an accomplished woman. Born on a farm near Pittsburgh, Jean was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Rodenbaugh. She graduated from Allegheny High School and the Martins School of Pittsburgh and taught in a Pittsburgh business college before her marriage in 1914. She had met Senator Davis while on a visit to California.

Mrs. Davis became the first Grand Regent of the Women of the Moose and was instrumental in organizing the Academy of Friendship Degree. She served as the first Past President of the Academy of Friendship of the Women of the Moose and was the only woman to sit as a member of the Supreme Executive Committee of the Loyal Order of Moose and the Board of Mooseheart Governors. She was also a member of the Protected Home Circle of Sharon, the Foresters of America, Order of the Eastern Star and Daughters of the American Revolution and was the first President of the Woman's Welsh Club of Washington.

James J Davis was a leader. A joiner. A man with the ability to organize large groups of people around a common cause. But Jean was the one who created the environment that made those people want to stay. While we often focus on James J Davis's vision of building this great Fraternity, we should also focus on Jean's efforts to make our homes welcome to our visitors.

The women have traditionally been the ones to do this. This is the reason we **MUST** maintain our Women of the Moose Chapters and continue to maintain a Lodge home that is attractive to our members and their guests for many years to come.


Mission and Purpose Statement
