

TREASURER MESSAGE

Here's hoping that everyone had a joyous Christmas and a happy start to the New Year of 2026. How time flies!

I have decided to dedicate this article to the history of a Treasurer in non-profit organizations which began in the 18th & 19th Centuries. As charitable organizations became more structured especially in Europe and the United States, the Treasurer position became formalized.

The rise of Charitable trusts, benevolent societies, and community associations required written bylaws.

Treasurers were elected officers responsible for:

- Recording donations
- Managing membership dues
- Paying expenses
- Reporting to the board or membership

In the late 1800s, many nonprofits adopted governance models similar to today's, with Treasurer as a key officer. This explosion of nonprofit activity in the 20th century, especially after World War II, transformed the Treasurer's responsibilities. Key developments were:

- **Tax-exempt status laws** (e.g., U.S. IRS 501(c) (3) rules required formal financial reporting)
- **Grant funding** introduced stricter accounting and auditing standards
- **Board governance models** emphasized fiduciary duty and oversight

The core identity hasn't changed despite centuries of evolution; one thing remains constant: **The Treasurer is the guardian of the Organization's financial integrity.**

- Ancient religious institutions (temples, monasteries) appointed individuals to safeguard donations and offerings
- Medieval guilds and mutual aid societies had officers responsible for dues, charitable funds, and emergency relief

These early Treasurers weren't accountants – they were **guardians of communal trust**. This laid the foundation for the Treasurer as a role tied to integrity, transparency, and accountability.

As you can see, the Treasurer's position is an important one that not only protects the financial accountability of the organization, but must have the **integrity, transparency and accountability** of all funds granted responsibility for.

Benefits of Transparency

- **Builds trust:** When members understand how decisions are made, they are more likely to feel valued and included
- **Reduces conflict:** Open communication prevents rumors or misinformation from taking hold.
- **Encourages accountability:** Leaders and committees remain responsible for actions and choices
- **Supports engagement:** Members are more motivated when they see the bigger picture and know how their contributions matter

Examples of Transparency

- Sharing meeting minutes and financial reports
- Clearly communicating organizational goals
- Providing updates on charity projects or community initiatives
- Inviting open discussion before major decisions

Working Together: Cooperation and Fraternalism

Fraternal organizations thrive on the idea that members support one another and work toward common good.

Elements of Effective Teamwork

- **Shared purpose:** A common mission or set of values that unites members
- **Respect and equality:** Each member's voice matters, regardless of position or tenure
- **Clear roles:** Everyone understands their responsibilities within committees or projects
- **Mutual support:** Members help each other personally and organizationally

Ways Collaboration Shows in a Fraternal Setting

- Joint planning of events or community outreach
- Committees that distribute the workload
- Mentorship between seasoned members and new initiates
- Conflict resolution through respectful dialogue

The Connection Between Transparency and Collaboration

Transparency supports teamwork; teamwork reinforces transparency. When members understand what is happening and why, they are more willing to contribute their time, skills, and ideas.

Together, these qualities create:

- Stronger relationships
- Higher participation
- More successful projects
- A healthier organizational culture
- A legacy that attracts and retains members

- Registration & housing opened on **December 8, 2025**
- Pre-registration closes on **May 29, 2026 (midnight)**
- After that, registration will be on-site only.

Moose Membership App Update

As announced in the January 14, 2026, Official Communications, the Moose Membership App now allows members to **record and submit Lodge volunteer hours directly through the app**. This is a fantastic enhancement that will make reporting easier and more accurate.

Sponsor Incentive Program

To support our goal of achieving a **fifth consecutive year of membership growth**, the Moose International Board of Directors has launched a new short-term Sponsor Incentive.

From November 1, 2025, through April 30, 2026, every time you sponsor your **fifth** new or re-enrolled member, you will receive a **one-time-use code** redeemable for:

- One year of your own Lodge dues
- One year of Lodge dues for another member
- Payment of a new or re-enrolled applicant's dues **plus** the \$20 application fee (when using the Online Lodge Membership Application)

There is **no limit** to the number of codes you can earn. Codes must be redeemed by **June 30, 2026**.

This incentive also applies to the **Moose Legion** and **Women of the Moose**.



Remember after hosting a **New Member Orientation** be sure to enter the attendees into the system, so the attendee and Lodge will get credit. Make your event **FUN**, send everyone home with a positive impression of The Moose and your Lodge.



The **Financial Review Committee**'s primary function is to perform a review of all District and Council of Higher Degrees (**CHD**) financial records at the Mid-Year Conference and Annual Convention.

District Secretaries (and/or Presidents) as well as Council of Higher Degrees Secretary/Treasurers (and/or Presidents) are responsible for ensuring their books are presented to the committee for inspection.

As we get ready for Mid-Year in Costa Mesa, please be prepared by ensuring that you bring the following:

- Printouts of all your District Distribution of Funds Reports (September 2025 - present)
- Printouts of all your Board of Officers meeting minutes (September 2025 - present)
- Printouts of all your Social meeting minutes (September 2025 - present)
- Receipt book
- Check book
- All bank statements (September 2025 – present)
- All deposit slips



All these items should be in the Financial Review room known as **Seal Beach** on the B-2 Level, no later than 10:00 am on Friday, March 20th.

Also, please update the audit spreadsheet and upload all required documents into Cognito.





The early leaders of the Loyal Order of Moose who were instrumental in establishing Mooseheart, the "Child City," were confident that as long as there was a Loyal Order of Moose, there would be a Mooseheart. But even in those early days of the 20th Century, these leaders envisioned the need for a trust fund to insure the future of Mooseheart against any possible emergency. Accordingly, it was suggested that an endowment fund be built to protect Mooseheart should that dismal day ever occur.

At the annual International Convention of the Order in 1918, Resolution No. 19 was passed authorizing Director General James J Davis to create and build such a fund for the protection of Mooseheart. But the 1918 convention was not a legislative convention, and the resolution was not fully recognized until it was passed a second time at the 1919 convention.

The first contribution to the Mooseheart Endowment Fund, of \$100, was received with a second contribution of \$200 and almost immediately donations began to pour in.

One of the many plans established to help expand the fund was for every Lodge and Chapter to take up a "penny collection" at its regularly called meetings. The term "penny collection" has since been changed to "Endowment Fund Offering", and now at every fraternal function in The Moose such collections are taken.

All Endowment Fund contributions are placed in the Mooseheart-Moosehaven Endowment Fund. In addition many individuals make contributions to the fund by direct mail.

Total contributions to the Mooseheart-Moosehaven Endowment Fund average more than a million dollars per year. These funds are administered by the board of trustees consisting of eight distinguished members of the fraternity.

DID YOU KNOW?

We have a **NEW** Fraternal unit! Welcome **Elk Grove Service Center #2731** to the California Nevada Moose Association (**CNMA**)!

As the CNMA Historian, I often reflect back to the beginning of the Moose Fraternity and look for trends. I took a few (~~minutes~~) hours to see how we've done things in the past. Here's what I found:

There have been **446 Lodges** in the states of California and Nevada since the fraternity was founded, back in the early 1900's. In California there have been 417 lodges and 29 in Nevada. That's a **LOT**!

Here's a Few Key Points:

- The first Moose Lodge in California was Chico Lodge #309, chartered in 1909
- The first Moose Lodge in Nevada was Reno Lodge #569 chartered in 1911
- The oldest continuously operating Moose Lodge in California is San Jose #401, which was chartered on 11/25/1910, beating Stockton #391 by a week
- The oldest continuously operating Moose Lodge in Nevada is Red Rock #252 which was chartered on 6/1/1980

The Moose Fraternity had a **LOT** of Lodges in California early on. There were seven Moose Lodges in California by 1910, then we added 45 more in 1911. James J Davis's message of a potential safety net for those hard working blue collar members was the push that put the Moose Fraternity into the forefront of the minds of men in California and Nevada for a century to come. Out of those 45 Lodges opened in 1911, 14 are still open today. Many of the others have merged out of redundancy.

From 1912 - 1920, 36 more Lodges opened. Some lasted a year or two and closed or merged with an adjacent Lodge, 4 of those remain to this day.

- From 1921 - 1931, 51 more lodges opened. Most of these Lodges later merged with other lodges with seven (7) of those lodges still in existence today.
- From 1932 - 1952, 48 new Lodges were opened. Most of the lodges later merged or closed with fourteen (14) of those lodges still in existence today.
- From 1953 - 1963, 71 more new Moose Lodges were opened, with 27 of those lodges still in existence today
- From 1964 - 1974, another 71 Lodges were opened, with 34 of those lodges still in existence today
- From 1975 - 1996, 65 more Lodges were opened, with 16 of those lodges still in existence today
- Not a lot has happened since that time except for the institution of several Service Centers such as Carson City, Sparks (which later merged with Carson City), Pomona, Las Vegas and Elk Grove

The CNMA, with its 57,755 members, is growing in number. These members live amongst fewer area Lodges since technology has made it easier for us to travel a greater distance.

Many of us often frequent other Lodges in our Association and this is **VERY GOOD!**

GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

Wishing you all a very Happy New Year. We all have so much to be thankful for Let us strive to make this a most prosperous New Year for all.

I will continue to the best of my ability to support all California Nevada Moose Association (CNMA) members and their families, as well as the Districts and Lodges within CNMA.

When this new CNMA year started, my first order of business was to contact all CNMA Territory Managers (TMs) and Lodges, to survey and identify those Lodges that do not have an Automated External Defibrillator (**AED**) on their Lodge premises. This was more of an effort than I thought it would be, and three months into the new CNMA year, I am happy to announce that the survey is complete.

This means I can now move forward with providing each Lodge with the pricing Tiers and program information available and necessary for each Lodge. This will help them to determine how they want to move forward in acquiring an **AED** for their respective Lodge. There are, at this time, 80 Lodges (out of our 107 CNMA Lodges) that do **not** have this essential lifesaving tool available to them.

My goal is to equip each Lodge with an **AED**, prior to our Mid-Year Conference in March. As I stated to the Territory Managers and Lodges, **"A life saved, could be your own!"**

In addition, I will be reviewing all new laws that went into effect for California and Nevada on January 1st to determine any possible impact they may have on our Lodges, and our day-to-day Moose mission. Almost 800 new laws went into effect in California alone, and more than 50 in Nevada. After a review of the new laws affecting our states, I will distribute that information to all Territory Managers and Lodges in the coming weeks.

LOSS PREVENTION

Brothers and Sisters of The Moose,

Happy New Year! I hope Santa was good to you and the holidays were enjoyable. Did you get down to your Lodge and share good times with fellow members? I hope so. When I walk through the doors of our Lodge, calm comes over me. A smile instantly comes to my face. I see and greet my friends, notice new people and welcome them (this is very important).

But then I do what good little Loss Prevention Officers do. Touch base with our Administrator and do a walk around the Lodge. Is there anything new in the incident report book? Do I see anything different since my last visit, or anything that looks "out of place." Most recently I noticed that some cooking utensils were missing. I thought, strange. I met with different members of the Lodge that cook often, and they noticed the same thing. Where are the long spoons, where are some of our storage containers and serving trays? Unfortunately, our conclusion was "Hall Rentals." While it might not seem like a big deal, when you start adding replacement costs for these items it can run into hundreds of dollars. It is our responsibility to account for the assets of our Lodges. We are also responsible for managing our Lodge Budgets which sometimes do not account for losses such as these.

Well, there needs to be a solution. Of course, it's as simple as a marking pen or an engraver to ensure whoever is using the kitchen is aware where that cookware came from. Is it fool proof? Only a fool would say yes. But it's something. Also, do you have a Kitchen Manager? Do they know their duties? Pantry, walk-in inventory – [check]. Kitchen cleanliness – [check], Scheduling cooks and meals – [check]. How about doing a walkthrough with the folks renting your hall prior to the event? Do you give them access to the kitchen and everything in it? Is it spelled out in a contract? Do you have liability insurance for any slips, falls, burns or cuts, while using the kitchen? And of course, make sure none of your "Stuff" leaves the building.

We want to think that the members we rent our Moose Home to are honest and for the most part, they are. Some things may accidentally get mixed in with the supplies they brought to their event. Again, well-marked items will minimize this occurrence. As I said, I only brought this subject up because I've noticed it in our Lodge. How about yours?

Secondly, we should start preparing for the upcoming **Annual Safety Report** that will be due before you know it. As always, your report must be in by **May 31, 2026**, to avoid penalties. Both our California Nevada Moose Association and Moose International websites have the Annual Safety Report form and the Continuous Accident Protection "CAP" Booklet which should be reviewed. If you need assistance I am happy to help as are your Territory Managers.
